Assessment Guidelines & Marking Criteria of your Curriculum Vitae

Your written submissions will be broadly assessed on four criteria:

- Clear job/sector specification
- Attention to detail
- Quality of evidence
- Organization and presentation

Note that to earn a particular mark on your CV, it does not have to fulfil that mark individually for each of the above four categories; this guideline is to help to show you what we are looking for, and our judgements will be formed on the predominant character of your submission. Evidence of strength in some areas may compensate for weaknesses in others.

There is no rule for the CV length, but 2 pages is the norm for a UK graduate CV, with exceptions by sector.

Checklist of essential elements required for all essays:

- ✓ Name, professional contact information
- √ Job or Sector to which you are applying
- ✓ Relevance: have you provided evidence for the job requirements?
- ✓ Is the CV easy to read (e.g., not enough white space, too many large paragraphs, etc.)?
- ✓ Consistent style, accurate spelling and grammar
- ✓ Coherent organisation of topics and/or skills
- ✓ Formatting is appropriate (e.g., bold, capitals, bullet points, etc.)

Assessment Breakdown for Curriculum Vitae:

5 Points Structure and Readability (grammar, spelling, formatting, etc.)

5 Points Quality of Presentation

Key points relevant and presented clearly

Transferrable skills backed up by facts/evidence/examples

Demonstrates understanding of chosen job/sector

+/-2 Points Discretionary marks (overall quality of CV)
