Module information and planning

Overview of the module pre-reg. process

- You need to **make your selection on MySIS** to indicate the modules you would like to take for next year.
- You will need to indicate your preferences, **including reserves**. Make sure you **fill up the reserves list**!
- For some modules, capacity is restricted.

Confirmation of choices: Programme Admin Team will process and make decisions on submitted requests and will confirm your choices.

Modules with pre-requisites (pre-reqs.)

- Some of our modules have pre-requisites.
- What is a **pre-requisite**? Why is it necessary?
 - Prior modules that you need to have taken in order to be prepared to take a given module.
 - E.g. to take LIN5214 Phonology II, you need to have taken LIN4210 Phonology I
 - These will be listed for each module in the module directory.

What happens if I don't have the pre-reqs?

You may still be able to take a module with convenor approval and subject to availability.

- Contact the module convenor (or Teaching Lead, Coppe)
- Have a discussion with **your academic advisor** about this

If the convenor agrees, they will fill in a **form** notifying the School Office, and you can submit your selection as per usual (but still before April 7).

• Still subject to availability!

If you <u>don't</u> have permission when you preregister

- If you select a module that you do not have the pre-requisites for, and the admin team does not have evidence of approval, you will automatically be assigned to one of your reserve choices or if this is not possible, a module selected by the Programme Admin Team.
- You will have another opportunity to register (subject to space) for that module at the start of the semester, but this time you will need to make sure you have convenor approval (i.e. convenor has agreed to fill a quick form to indicate this.)
- You do not need permission if you already have the pre-requisites.

Doing a Dissertation in Linguistics

- LIN042 English/Linguistics Research Project = "Dissertation module"
- In order to do a UG Dissertation in LINGUISTICS (i.e. LIN042), you will need to ensure you have done LIN5202 Research Methods in Year 2 (i.e. it is a pre-requisite)
- Why? LIN5202 Research Methods prepares you to undertake a research project.

Doing a Dissertation in Linguistics

- If you are in a single-honours degree, then this is just automatic since all of you do LIN5202.
- BUT, if you are in a joint-honours degree in Y1, then you do need to do a bit planning to ensure you do LIN5202 if you want to do a dissertation in Linguistics in your final year.
- You don't necessarily have to decide now, since you can change into the module latest in Semester 2 of Year 2.

Doing a Dissertation in Linguistics

• If you are in **English Literature and Linguistics**, you can only do *one* dissertation module (either in English Literature OR Linguistics).

What if I'm in Year 2, and I haven't done LIN5202 and want to do a Ling. Dissertation?

• We look at this on a **case-by-case basis** depending on the idea for the project, and your preparation. Reach out to **the module convenor** (or Teaching Lead, Coppe).

Dissertation module! Finding a topic, developing your research question

Working with native speakers to find out the patterns of a language that's unknown to you. Discover patterns that maybe others haven't!

How does language relate to gender and sexuality?

Explore language and communication in other modalities, e.g. video interactions, emojis etc.

How is language used to communicate about health, how does this differ by communities, roles, etc. What are its effects? Learn how to code in Python – useful skill for many jobs these days!

Things to keep in mind

- It is possible for you to take modules outside of Linguistics, and outside of SLLF (subject to pre-requisites, space etc.) as part of your electives
- It is possible for you to take modules that are not at your current level of study
- For e.g., If you're in Year 3 (Level 6), you are able to take up to TWO modules at Level 5 (Y2)
 - See Programme Specifications for details

Things to keep in mind

- For single-honours going into Year 3 (Level 6): make sure that you will have done 240 credits (roughly 16 modules) in Linguistics by the time you are finished.
- For joint-honours going into Year 3 (Level 6): make sure that you will have done 150 credits (roughly 10 modules) in Linguistics by the time you are finished.
- You <u>cannot</u> take modules at Level 4 if you're going into Year 3

Top Tips for Students

- Module registration is <u>NOT</u> first-come, first-served. All module choices submitted in MySIS by the deadline will be considered equally.
- Don't miss the deadline it creates a lot of extra work to chase you up.
 - And if you are very late, your selection will be made for you.
- Your module selection will be factored into timetabling for the new year, so take time to make considered choices.

Top Tips for Students

- Pay attention to the semester balance of module credits. 60-60 balance is ideal.
 - 45-75 or 75-45 can be accepted, but keep in mind you will have an unbalanced workload, and **that's your responsibility to manage.**
- Provide at least 4 reserve choices within SLLF you would be happy to take, make sure the reserve modules are different from those in your main selection. (Provide as MANY reserve choices as you are allowed.)

Top Tips for Students

- MySIS will not allow you to proceed with your selection unless your programme requirements are met.
- Any modules where the pre-requisites are not met will **automatically be replaced by a reserve choice.**
- If a module needs to be replaced and no valid reserve choices are provided, the Programme Admin Team will choose a module on your behalf.
