What to expect

- Intro session and induction (maximum one week induction)
- Regular Student Surgery sessions with feedback (3 4 per week): combining virtual and face-to-face patient contact, a minimum of 3-4 patients per session
- Backroom practice work Chronic Disease Reviews, Administrative work, Medication reviews and prescribing, and QOF follow-up
- Professional shadowing sitting in and assisting with GP and/or members of the MDT. (1st week shadowing then really should be doing own clinics)
- One GP-based Tutorial session per week approximately 90 to 120 mins in length
- Working as part of the Practice Team attending appropriate meetings, learning from various team members
- Self-Directed Learning sessions (2 half-days per week) to allow time for assessment work and general learning

Pass:

- Formative assessments completed and reflected to a satisfactory standard.
- Competent in skills and attitudes to begin work as a FY1.
- Satisfactory engagement with practice activities.
- Is safe with patients.

Referred:

- Poor engagement with the formative assessments without extenuating circumstances.
- Requires significant improvement with clinical and communication skills.
- Inadequate knowledge base Lacks insight on own abilities.
- Concerns regarding patient safety.

Student Feedback from 23-24

- Learning needs assessed at start and focus on upskilling
- Variety of patients across specialties
- Increasing in complexity week by week
- Lots of clinical exposure
- Valued member of the clinical team
- Good support from GP Tutors
- Detailed and constructive feedback after each patient
- Interactions with medically complex patients
- Taught how to use clinical software (System one/Emis)

'If every placement was like this one, students would be more motivated, proactive and engaged in not only their placement rotation but their degree generally. This placement has given me the confidence boost I needed and was the perfect way to start final year'



What Students feel could be improved:

- Less shadowing and shorter induction
- Quicker start to student surgeries
- Protected SDL time
- More revision time in Block C
- Wednesday afternoon protected for sports and activities
- Provide basic medical equipment for student use
- Clear instructions on whether to send patients home or debrief first

'Clearer instructions/rules - when we had our first clinics we let some patients go before letting the GP tutor see them. We covered this with our tutor and he agreed for next time that he would make sure to let the students know next time not to let patients go without him seeing/discussing them.'



Block C Feedback 23.24

"This is more a feedback for the university, but I think GP should not be the last block before finals. I know with how large our year groups are, this is not always possible."

"Whilst I found the placement did help me learn for osces, I did really struggle with doing finals revision with a full on placement".

"I do think that I would have preferred to not take any SDLs for the first few weeks and then have a week or 1.5 weeks off before finals."

"Ultimately, we are adult learners and if our GP tutors feel that we are meeting the objectives of the placement, I think we should be allowed more flexibility. I also think that if the uni will allow this kind of flexibility, they need to communicate this well with the GP tutors."


