

Guide to The Cochrane Library

The critically appraised Cochrane systematic reviews are considered to be the highest quality source of evidence available to support decision making in medical practice. Along with other medical literature these reviews can be found at www.thecochranelibrary.com.

There are three ways that the Cochrane Library can be searched.

1. Simple search box



3. Click on Advanced Search

In the Advanced Search function use **Search all text** to search all fields, otherwise use the drop-down box to select the specific field you wish to search.

2. Browse through topic headings

You can search multiple search terms and link them together using AND, OR or NOT in the left-hand drop-down box.

SEARCH TIPS Tip No. 1: Boolean operators AND, OR, and NOT can be selected from the pulldown selection boxes or entered directly within the search text boxes. Use parentheses to separate components when entering complex search directly in text box with mixed Boolean Example: (colchicine AND liver) AND (fibrosis OR cirrhosis) Tip No. 2: The AND operator is used by default between search terms. The string brain stem will match ords where both words are included in any order or proximity. Search for exact phrases by enclosing a string in quotation



marks.

Advanced Features

As an alternative to searching for everything in one go you can gradually build up a search history by searching for each component of your search individually.

Your search history then appears as a list of your searches which you can then edit, rerun or combine without losing your original search.



Search hints

- Truncate your search term using an asterisk (*) after the stem of your word. This will search for all the terms that begin with that stem; so in the example above injury, injuries, injured etc.
- When combining using AND or OR use the numbers of the searches you wish to combine preceded by the hash symbol, e.g. #3 AND #4.
- To search for a phrase it must be enclosed within double quotes. For example use "vitamin a", otherwise it will search for 'vitamin' AND 'a' because 'a' is a searchable term.
