In this exam  $G$  denotes Newton's gravitational constant and  $\partial_a = \frac{\partial}{\partial x^a}$ . Unless otherwise stated, the indices  $a, b, c, \dots$  run from 0 to 3. Also, all expressions should be simplified as much as possible.

**Question 1 [15 marks].** Consider a covariant vector  $A_i$ .

- (a) Write down the transformation law for  $A_i$  under general coordinate transformations. [5]
- (b) Consider the object  $F_{ij} = \partial_i A_j - \partial_j A_i$ , where  $\partial_i \equiv \frac{\partial}{\partial x^i}$ . Compute the transformation of  $F_{ij}$  under a general coordinate transformation. Is  $F_{ij}$  a tensor? [10]

**Question 2 [20 marks].** In this question you should assume that the dimension  $n$  of the manifold satisfies  $n \geq 4$ .

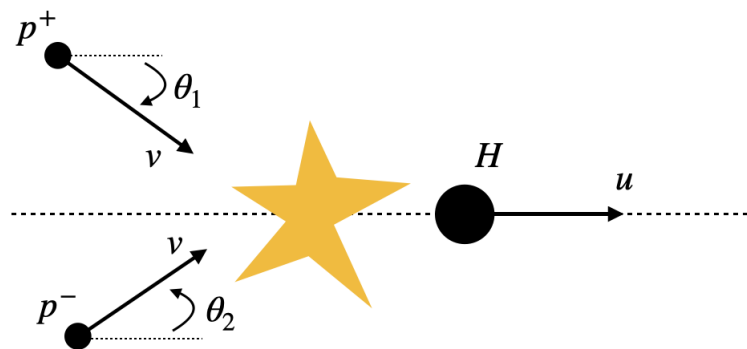
- (a) Write the Riemann tensor as a combination of the Weyl tensor, the Ricci tensor and the Ricci scalar. [5]
- (b) Using that  $\nabla^a G_{ab} = 0$ , where  $G_{ab}$  is the Einstein tensor, express the divergence of the Ricci tensor,  $\nabla^a R_{ab}$ , in terms of the Ricci scalar. [5]
- (c) Using the Bianchi identity for the Riemann tensor,

$$\nabla_{[a} R_{bc]de} = 0,$$

where  $\nabla_a$  is the Levi-Civita connection, compute  $\nabla^a C_{abcd}$ . [10]

**Question 3 [10 marks].** Consider the collision of a proton and an anti-proton both with rest mass  $m_p$  and 3-velocity  $\mathbf{v}$  in units of  $c = 1$ .

- (a) Assuming that the collision is head on along the  $x$  axis so that the 3-velocities of the proton and the anti-proton are  $\mathbf{v}$  and  $-\mathbf{v}$  respectively, find the value of  $v$  so that the collision produces a Higgs boson at rest with rest mass  $M_H = 125 m_p$ . [5]
- (b) Consider now that both the proton and the anti-proton move along the positive  $x$ -direction forming an angle  $\theta_1$  and  $\theta_2$  respectively with respect to the  $x$ -axis in the  $x - y$  plane. See the Figure below. Find  $v$ ,  $\theta_1$  and  $\theta_2$  such that the Higgs boson that is formed as a result of the collision moves only along the positive  $x$ -direction with 3-velocity  $\mathbf{u} = \frac{\sqrt{3}}{2}$ . **Question 4 [20 marks].** Consider the general static spherically symmetric spacetime with metric

$$ds^2 = -e^{2A(r)} dt^2 + e^{2B(r)} dr^2 + r^2(d\theta^2 + \sin^2 \theta d\phi^2),$$

as written in the lecture notes. In addition, consider an anti-symmetric (0,2) tensor  $F_{ab}$  whose only non-vanishing components are  $F_{tr} = -F_{rt} = -\frac{Q}{r^2}$ , where  $Q$  is a positive constant.

- (a) Show that the Einstein equations

$$G_{ab} = 8\pi G T_{ab}$$

are equivalent to the so called trace-reversed Einstein equations

$$R_{ab} = 8\pi G \left( T_{ab} - \frac{1}{2} g_{ab} T \right)$$

where  $T \equiv T^a_a$  is the trace of the energy momentum tensor. [5]

- (b) Compute the energy momentum tensor  $T_{ab}$  for  $F_{ab}$ :

$$T_{ab} = \frac{1}{4\pi} \left( F_{ac} F_b{}^c - \frac{1}{4} g_{ab} F_{cd} F^{cd} \right)$$

Is  $T_{ab}$  traceless? [5]

- (c) Solve the trace-reversed Einstein equations in (a) using  $T_{ab}$  computed in (b), fixing the integration constant so that the  $Q \rightarrow 0$  limit reduces to the Schwarzschild spacetime. You can use the components of the Ricci tensor for a spherically symmetric static spacetime computed in the lectures. [10]

**Question 5 [20 marks].** Consider the line element

$$ds^2 = \left( 1 - \frac{2GM}{r} + \frac{GP^2}{r^2} \right) dt^2 + \left( 1 - \frac{2GM}{r} + \frac{GP^2}{r^2} \right)^{-1} dr^2 + r^2(d\theta^2 + \sin^2\theta d\phi^2),$$

where  $M$  and  $P$  are constants satisfying  $M > P > 0$ .

- (a) Find the expressions for the conserved energy  $E$  and angular momentum  $L$  along the geodesics associated to the Killing vectors  $\frac{\partial}{\partial t}$  and  $\frac{\partial}{\partial \phi}$  respectively. [5]
- (b) Find the effective potential  $V(r)$  that governs the radial motion of the geodesics:

$$\frac{1}{2} \left( \frac{dr}{d\lambda} \right)^2 + V(r) = \mathcal{E},$$

where  $\lambda$  is the affine parameter along the geodesics and  $\mathcal{E} = \frac{1}{2}E^2$  is defined in the lecture notes. [5]

- (c) Sketch  $V(r)$  for the null geodesics. You should assume  $L > 0$ . [5]
- (d) Does this spacetime have any horizon(s)? If so, write down the spacetime metric above in ingoing Eddington-Finkelstein coordinates that are smooth at the horizon(s). [5]

**Question 6 [15 marks].** The only non-vanishing component of the quadrupole moment tensor of a rod of length  $L$  and mass  $M$  aligned with the  $x'$ -axis is

$$I^{x'x'} = \frac{1}{12} ML^2.$$

- (a) Find the components of the quadrupole moment tensor  $I^{ij}$  in a frame in which the rod is rotating with angular velocity  $\Omega$ :

$$\begin{aligned}x &= x' \cos(\Omega t) + y' \sin(\Omega t), \\y &= -x' \sin(\Omega t) + y' \cos(\Omega t), \\z &= z'\end{aligned}$$

(Note that  $I^{ij}$  is a tensor with only spatial components and hence the indices  $i, j$  only take the values  $x, y$  and  $z$ .) [5]

- (b) Calculate the power radiated in gravitational waves by the rotating rod. [10]
