Why did you decide to take a year in industry?

The main reason I decided to choose a year in industry is to get an opportunity to know more about the profession I am mostly interested in. The knowledge I gain would help me to choose my 3rd year modules to develop skills needed for the chosen career pathway.

What was the most challenging part of any application for you? How did you overcome it?

My application process was quite long in terms of the number of stages and time needed to finish them. The most challenging part in EY application process was the real-life case with data analysis. I had 24 hours to format the data, analyse it and provide a solution with a nice presentation.

What have you learnt from the whole application process that will be helpful when looking for a graduate role?

I would say that the most important stage in an application process is a preparation which includes writing a CV, Cover Letter and solving cases and numerical tests. Being prepared gives you a chance to complete an application process successfully.

What advice would you give to students who are looking for their industrial placements now?

I would recommend starting to read about different industries to choose the career pathway they are interested in. After they choose the right industry, they need to do research about the best companies and their departments. Every department has a unique set of skills it is looking for, knowing that they can focus on exact cases and tests during the preparation.

What would you say to students who are not sure they want to do a full year out of university?

I would say that it is a nice opportunity to decide whether they want to continue the education and go to masters or finish the bachelor and start working. Besides, they can get a graduate role offer during the year in industry which makes them more confident in their future.

Did you receive many rejections? What advice would you give to students having a tough time with rejections?

Yes, I got a tonne of rejections. I want to highlight that getting a rejection doesn't mean a student is not good enough; it usually means that a company is looking for a different person with different set of skills. Thus, reading about the role and company values should help students decide whether the company fits their skillset or not.

What are three things that you are enjoying the most about your current role?

- 1) I work in heavy industry consulting with the biggest mining/production companies
- 2) I got a promotion after 5 months of working and now I am a stream leader with the team of 4 people on a big project
- 3) Constantly improving my soft and hard skills, using helpful software (Power BI, Power Automate etc.)
